Mayor Pennington called the meeting to order at 5:30pm and asked Councilmember Gammage to lead in the invocation and Pledge of Allegiance.

PRESENTATIONS

Certified 2019 Special Election Results were presented by the City Clerk and the City Council confirmed the results with no objections.

Swearing in of Bobby McGee as the newly elected Councilmember for District 6: Mayor Pennington administered the Oath of Office to Bobby McGee. Councilmember McGee stated that he was grateful and looks forward to serving the people of the community and seeing that we keep the good things going to attract more people here.

Girl Scout Week Proclamation: Mayor Pennington invited the girl scouts to join Council and have their picture made while he presented the Girl Scout Week 2019 proclamation.

Lincoln Village Complex Proposal - Tabernacle of Faith Outreach Ministries, Bishop Mouzon and his wife Karen, who is an Assistant Pastor, explained that their ministry, which is a 501(C)(3) non-profit, has a vision for outreach and to give back to the community affordable housing. Phase I would be quad apartments that would be safe and affordable. It would allow those who have left Hartsville to come back home. This project would show that someone cares and wants to make Hartsville great again. The construction of these would create jobs. The church was established a month ago and is currently meeting in the conference center at The Landmark with property on Sixth Street to build a conference center. This is the first time doing a project on this scale, but have a building team ready to

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get started. Mayor Pennington explained that there is a tremendous opportunity here, but there are some hurdles with that large piece of property. Council will take information into consideration and the next step will be to meet with the City Manager and Councilmember Mack to look at sites.

WHEREAS, a Congenital Diaphragmatic Hernia is often a life-threatening birth defect because it limits the growth of the lungs and occurs in every 1 in 2,500 live births in the United States, which accounts for 8% of all major congenital anomalies; and,

WHEREAS, proactive diagnosis and appropriate management of fetuses with congenial diaphragmatic hernias minimize the incidence of emergency situations, dramatically improving survival rates; and,

WHEREAS, there is a need for increased public awareness of congenital diaphragmatic hernias to provide an opportunity for families whose lives have been affected to celebrate life and to remember loved ones lost, to honor dedicated health professionals, and to meet others and know they are not alone; and,

WHEREAS, groups such as Breath of Hope, Inc. are working to promote public awareness and encourage research efforts to one day prevent or successfully treat all those diagnosed with a congenital diaphragmatic hernia and the establishment of Congenital Diaphragmatic Hernia Day will provide the opportunity to share experience and information with the public and the media in order to raise public awareness about the Congenital Diaphragmatic Hernia birth defect.

Applications

GSSM – 145 W. Carolina Ave. – door & window signs

Jon Shannon was present to participate in the discussion regarding GSSM's proposal to place vinyllettered signs on the three (3) doors and two (2) windows. The sign on the doors would be six (6) square feet each. The sign on the windows would be 10 square feet each. Staff recommended that GSSM increase the size of the signs on the window. Tuten made a motion to approve the signs as submitted with the option to enlarge the window sign not to exceed the 90 square foot maximum signage. Second: Wingfield; Carried: All in favor.

Coker College – 217 E. Carolina Ave. – Certificate of Appropriateness

Tracy Parkinson of Coker College and Kevin Rolling, and Kate Vignean of Credo Design Architects were present to participate in the discussion regarding Coker College's proposal for a Certificate of Appropriateness for exterior work proposed at 217 East Carolina Avenue. The building received a historic designation on July 10, 2018. The building is currently 6400 – 6500 square feet. A 2,500 square foot addition was proposed. A courtyard was also proposed. The courtyard would have an outdoor classroom space with seating and a water feature. A waterfall with history storytelling and outdoor event space is being explored.

The addition would have a similar tone and look as the existing building. The interior is a shell only. Rolling said they looked at similar buildings downtown to understand the character and mimic what has been set as a precedent. The entrance on East Carolina Avenue will be maintained. The existing windows will be closed. The existing brick will be used to patch the façade. The storefront on East Carolina Avenue will mimic the storefront on page 16 of the presentation. The windows will be up high on the south elevation.

Rolling recommended a standing seam metal roof. Wingfield asked if the standing seam roof would be visible above the parapet. Goodson asked if the roof would be pre-formed. Mr. Rolling stated that the roof would be a knife-edge design. Goodson asked the color. Rolling said the roof would be dark bronze or black. The roof on the addition would be a single slope roof.



The Hartsville Police department employs 36 sworn positions, 3 civilians, and 8 crossing guards

Spring and Summer 2018 showed a marked increase in citations, however fall and winter showed the usual slump. May showed our highest rates of ticket issuance for the previous 12 months. Hurricanes had a drastic impact on citations in September and October. Officers were involved with Hurricane preparation and flood mitigation, and wrote fewer tickets. January and March showed an increase with a February slump.



March had a huge spike in arrests, due in large part to Operation Spring Freeze. April-June had shown a gradual drop towards average, with a large percentage of offenders being from outside the City limits. October had a marked decrease in arrests, however Arrests began returning to more of a normal level. Although November to December showed a slight decrease, there was not as much as an arrest slump as there was a citation slump. January had a huge rise in arrests followed by a slump towards average, whilst March showed a slight increase.

Arrestees and Victims

On average, between 50-65% of arrested persons come from outside the city limits, showing that we serve many more people than our in-town population.

In March there were 174 arrests, including 11 Juveniles.

WHEREAS, Licensor and Licensee entered into a License Agreement dated January 9, 2001, pursuant to which Licensor Licensed to Licensee a portion of the tower site located on 140 South Cedar Lane, Hartsville, South Carolina 30824 described in Exhibit A of the License Agreement; and

WHEREAS, Licensor and Licensee entered into a First Amendment to the License Agreement dated January 9, 2015 (collectively the License Agreement dated January 9, 2001 and First Amendment are hereinafter referred to as the "Agreement"); and

Licensee shall also replace the existing corral antenna mount with a new corral antenna mount. Exhibit B of the Agreement is deleted in its entirety and replaced with a new Exhibit B DESCRIPTION OF PREMISES AND EQUIPMENT, attached hereto.

2. Commencing on the first day of the month following the date that Licensee begins installation of the modifications set forth in this Second Amendment, Rent shall be increased by Six Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$6,000.00) per year, partial year to be prorated.
